Dear Friends,

I've always thought we make more out of the celebration of New Year's Eve than it probably deserves. Humbug. I know. But if you're not the kind of person usually given to big, wild, noisy parties, what exactly does it have to offer? Seriously? In these days before the big night, I'm wondering what Times Square is going to look like this year. Personally, I'm more the quiet gathering of friends, good food, meaningful conversations and board games type. Most years that's been entirely possible. This year; not so much. Hunkered down amid the raging pandemic, our celebrations might lean more toward quiet times of reflection, a glass of wine, and maybe a Zoom meeting with distant family members. This last year has changed our approach to a good many things.

Still, the coming of a new year always invites our looking both backward and forward. Many people have been saying that 2020 is a year we'd all love to forget, but we probably never will. The pandemic, the protests, the election, and the losses that cut across many of our lives made for a year that, at very least, united much of the world in a common sense crisis. While we are still very much in the thick of it, there is reason to believe that spring will bring a thaw in more ways than

usual. We're soon to have a new administration in Washington which, whether or not it was your personal choice, will nonetheless bring changes; hopefully some for the better. The new vaccines promise to begin shaking off the worst effects of Covid-19, soon we hope. And against all odds, our First Congregational Church community remains strong, mostly healthy and better connected than we might have imagined we would be by now. We've made some wonderful adjustments to online church, we've been very intentional about maintaining connections with one another, and we have had a terrifically affirming stewardship campaign, which comes as a terrific vote of confidence in these uncertain times. Of course, we all look very much forward to being face-to-face in worship, music, prayer and fellowship before too long. But what we have created online will most likely continue as an expansion of the very important ministries of our church. I would call that a very positive development.

It has certainly been a wild and crazy year in many ways. I'd personally be alright if 2021 is a bit more boring. But we have risen to the occasion of our crazy times with faith, love and grace, and despite all the recent challenges, that at least deserves to be celebrated. In the coming year, I trust that now that we have "suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called [us] to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish [us]."





**“Windows to the Soul:  
Lighting the Heart of the City”

The First Congregational Church building, on the corner of Hanover and Union Streets, was built in 1880, with windows fashioned by the renowned glassmaker, Samuel West. One hundred forty years later, these windows have again come to prominence after a year-long restoration project, thanks to the Estate of Rose Arthur.



The craft of creating stained glass is highly specialized. Each section of each window is comprised of individually cut pieces of glass decorated and leaded together, so fragility is of paramount concern. The decoration, painted onto the glass, is fired in a kiln to fuse together. Each decorated section is held in place by leaded support bars. All this has been restored to its original prominence. These windows offer a look into the soul of Christianity while also showcasing inclusivity. Each scene tells a story of spirituality and faith, as well as artistic creativity. The East Wall of the main sanctuary depicts Moses and the Ten Commandments, the cornerstone of many faiths, followed by the Disciple John, holding a Bible. Next comes the Good Shepherd, who goes after even one lost sheep.

The next two panels create one scene: the Angel Gabriel visiting Mary, who is calming sitting, reading a Bible (sic). The vibrancy of the colors here – green for hope and blue which becomes the enduring color of Mary – makes this window a Central focus of the Biblical stories and encapsulates the predominant colors used in windows throughout the sanctuary. The West Wall windows depict figurative symbols of spiritual life: Purity, an angel holding a lily; Prayer, an angel looking upward, with hands clasped in prayer pose; angel with Open Bible, an invitation to all; the Cross and Crown, symbols of Jesus’s death and resurrection, and the promise of the ‘crown’ of everlasting life.

The circular windows above, representing God’s never-ending love, depict symbols from the Old Testament which transfer to the New Testament: For example, the sacrificial lamb becomes the New Testament symbol of Christianity. The Star of David was used in earlier times by Muslims, Christians, and Jews. Above the Annunciation window, is one with Three Cherubs, the number three playing a significant role from ancient times (3 Fates, 3 Graces, 3 Furies, Holy Trinity). And finally, there is the Dove, a universal sign of peace. These windows recognize the universality of many aspects of religion, and reveal the welcoming nature of First Church from its inception.

In addition to the ‘story’ windows, the main sanctuary hosts several others depicting various geometrical designs and floral motifs (note the South Entrance) intended to bring the outside world to sanctuary, again offering a welcome to all.

## \*REOPENING UPDATE\*

Dear Members and Friends of FCC,

The Reopening Task Force has been meeting regularly, keeping apprised of the overall health of our church, its people, and its programs. Excitement, vitality, and connectivity abound! Stewardship has moved forward, the dedicated staff continues to keep its fingers on the pulse of the day-to-day goings-on, kind volunteers reach out to the homebound with warm words and delicious treats, and the many inspiring worship opportunities keep us all connected to one another and to our faith. The Sunday worship service has become a true highlight of the week, meaningful, engaging, and faith affirming. We truly have much for which to be grateful.

Yet as our community continues to feel the impact of the Corona virus, we at First Church have watched closely the statistics in our community. While the state as a whole has seen a marked increase in positivity rate to nearly 10%, (well over 1000 new cases daily), in Manchester the numbers are even more significant. In December alone several daily new cases hovered around the 200 mark. This is, indeed, a worrisome trend. The vaccine, while shining a light in the midst of all of this, is far from being widely enough circulated in the next few months to offer any significant hope of obliterating the virus soon.

After careful consideration of all the above, and with the New Hampshire Conference of the UCC's strong recommendation, the Reopening Task Force has voted to recommend to Council that we continue as we are, halting on-site meetings and extending virtual worship, all through the end of March. This will, of course, necessitate that the Annual Meeting in March be held virtually, though more information about that will be forthcoming. Meanwhile, the Task Force will continue to meet and, should any significant changes occur, we will keep you informed. Meanwhile, do know that we continue to look ahead and plan for all options, knowing that God keeps us in the palm of his hand.
