Dear Friends,

I was part of a very interesting gathering the other day with a wonderful group of socially conscious people. We met, online, partly to discuss what had just happened in Washington, shortly after the Capitol building was overrun. We all shared our thoughts and feelings in a conversation that proved to be very helpful. And we began with a question: "Where is the Church in all this?"

I think that question rose from a sense of frustration that the "moral authority" of Christianity was not much in evidence, either during or immediately after the outbreak of violence. As a matter of fact, that very day, the National Council of Churches did issue a statement condemning the violence, and I have since read that the Pope and others in faith have strongly condemned the violence as well. But, having been immersed in that day's news myself, both online and on TV, I had to admit I couldn't remember hearing much of anything that would qualify as a "religious perspective."

Fifty years ago, if something major happened somewhere in the country, we could count on our news organizations trotting out some well-respected denominational official to give that perspective. There was a whole collection of nationally known people, from Billy Graham to Robert Schuller to the Niebuhr brothers and many others. They represented a range of theologies, but all were part of a more or less trusted, nation-wide, institutional church. These days ... well, I haven't heard from anyone like that for a while, have you?

A lot has happened in those 50 years. People don't trust or respect the collective wisdom of institutions much anymore. Of course, they weren't always deserving of respect. In my youth, for good reasons, we were quick to line up behind the bumper sticker that read "Question Authority." But over time, that questioning has evolved into a deep distrust of authority

of any kind. Authorities—religious, political and social—used to set standards for what was healthy and appropriate, what was real and dependable. Today, many people reject the entire notion of a "reality" that applies to all of us. And the idea that any "institution" should have the power to set standards on our behalf is not always taken very seriously.

Instead, we make up our own realities, to serve our own agendas. What's real stops being something we can all agree on and becomes instead whatever our chosen tribe says it is. It becomes whatever we can lead, convince or force people into believing, by whatever means necessary. And, it inevitably leads to conflict among those holding onto different versions of what is true.

The idea that there is no such thing as a "truth" that applies to all of us is very popular these days, and not easy to argue with. But considering the consequences of this belief, some of which we witnessed last week, let me offer an alternative. I believe that Truth is another name for what we call God. And, I believe, as you've heard me say many times, that God is infinite, and therefore beyond our finite knowledge. Because of our human limitations, we can never know the full and complete Truth of God. But we can, to some degree, line up our partial versions of the truth with that larger Truth. We can gradually expand our knowledge of the Truth by combining our small human visions into larger and larger wholes. What often prevents us from doing this is the ego-centric assumption that our own version of the truth is already full and complete, and therefore we are entirely justified in shoving it down the throats of all non-believers.

The key here is to recognize that no matter how important our own truth is to us, and no matter how foreign other versions of the truth might feel, there must necessarily be a larger truth that encompasses both. Believing in the larger truth of God is an act of faith. Believing that, by ourselves, we can only ever know a small part of God's Truth is an act of humility. Faith and humility would go a long way towards healing our nation if we could but get people to embrace them. It's certainly a tall order, after so many years of conflict and division. But the resources for beginning are right there in the faith we already claim to embrace. When Jesus said, "You will know the Truth, and the Truth shall set you free," he was talking about the one he called "Abba."

We are finally making plans for my ordination which will be in April. We don't know if the church will be open for gatherings by then, but the ordination will happen one way or the other. My article today is a nutshell version of how I got to this point.

Most people don't take as long as I did to complete the requirements for Ordination. When I started out I didn't even want to be ordained. I just wanted to get some education in Pastoral Care to help me do the best job I could do in serving the congregation in my capacity as Director of Parish Care.

I found a wonderful program at Andover Newton Theological school in which I would receive a Certificate in Spiritual and Pastoral Care and that led me to become a Commissioned Minister in Pastoral Care. The end? Nope!!

I had really liked being in school again and learning, so I decided to continue taking courses, this time online through New York School of Ministry, just for my own knowledge and the joy of being back in school. REALLY?! I was taking religious courses and learning more and more about the Bible and our church history, and I thought I might like to try preaching. In my internship at Havenwood Heritage Heights, I had to conduct two church services for the residents and I liked that, so Kevin was very supportive and I led a worship service at FCC. Now this was quite different than leading a service for about 20 people in a Nursing Home. When I stepped up to that lectern my knees were shaking, my palms were sweaty, and I was thinking, "What

am I doing?!?!" But then I started talking and looking out at all of your friendly, supportive faces and I started feeling better. So I did more preaching and took a preaching course, and I was hooked.

Then Kevin asked if I would like to lead Communion. OK. I did need to get licensed to do that and the first time I served, I helped Kevin. As I was standing at the Communion Table and looking out at all of you I felt the call to become ordained and serve the church in every capacity possible. It was an overwhelming moment and it was all I could do to hold back the tears. Someone asked me what that moment felt like and I said it was like God giving me a great big air hug.

I talked to Kevin about it the next day and I was on my way. At that time one of the requirements was to have a Masters in Divinity Degree, so I started that with Sioux Falls Seminary. Then the requirements for Ordination changed and they no longer require a Masters degree, so I completed the other requirements I needed and here we are. I am still working on my Masters, since I like to finish what I start, but the pressure is off.

Being an ordained minister was not a life-long dream of mine. The call came late in my life, but as I look back at my life experiences, I can see where God was preparing me and He knew just the right moment to say "NOW, Barbara. Go for it."

No matter what your age, listen to God. Listen and don't be afraid to make changes, take risks, and try new things. You will know when it is God who is leading you.

Thank you my friends, for being with me through all of my challenges. You have been a huge part of my journey.



also continue to support efforts of the Connecting the Congregation Team, including sending notes, delivering CDs, and participating in fellowship and social activities.



Like you, we can't wait until we can give people real hugs and see their faces light up as we deliver the food that our wonderful volunteers have made for them.

This is a Team effort and we thank all who participate in providing the food and delivering. Peggy and I would also like to thank Joan Currier, Martha Perich and Nancy Simmons who help us with weekly notes and birthday cards.

One of the cards we received after our December goody bags delivery, thanked us for providing a wonderful lunch. She asked who had made the soup and if they would please share the recipe! So below we are sharing one of the soup recipes that volunteers have made for the Meal Train...

Chicken or Turkey Rice Soup


Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 medium yellow onion, *chopped*
- 2 garlic cloves, *minced*
- 2 medium carrots, *chopped*
- 2 celery ribs, *cut into 1/2-inch-thick slices*
- 4 fresh thyme sprigs
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 quarts chicken stock or broth, *we use low sodium*
- 1 cup of water
- 1 cup long grain white rice, *uncooked*
- 2 cups shredded cooked chicken or turkey, *can use rotisserie chicken*
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, *to taste*



Instructions

- Place a large pot over medium heat and add the olive oil.
- Add the onion, garlic, carrots, celery, thyme and bay leaf.
- Cook and stir for about 6 minutes, until the vegetables are softened but not browned.
- Pour in the chicken broth and water and bring the liquid to a boil.
- Add in the rice and chicken; season with salt and pepper.
- Cook on medium-low until the rice is tender, about 25-30 minutes.
- Serve warm, and enjoy.
