Dear Friends,

The Lenten season has been very powerful for me this year. As I continue to sort out my life and my heart after Pam's loss, I have been drawn deeply into prayer and journaling. The affirmations of our faith — that light shines in the darkness, that all things work together for good, that love is the heart of our ministry, that death itself has been surpassed — all come to me with fresh poignancy this year.

It is not alone in the church where these things are true. All of life is balanced in the scales between crucifixion and resurrection. Like the Yin and Yang symbol of the Taoist tradition, light and darkness are in an eternal, inseparable dance with one another. The stories we tell of Holy Week and Easter are simply the ways that we, as Christian people, embody these truths. That is not to diminish Easter, but to set it in the larger context of what has been going on in all of creation since the dawn of time.

We live, for the most part, in the moment-to-moment reali-

ties of daily life. But in prayer, deep prayer, we may briefly step outside of time into the "great quiet of God," as Rauschenbusch put it. We may enter a space in which the anguishments of our lives can be seen against the larger harmony of God. We awaken to the truth of our humanity, which is that we live always and forever with one foot in each camp. We are children both of time and eternity.

I once shared a favorite passage with you from C.S. Lewis's space trilogy. The story tells of an epic struggle between good and evil which finally ends in victory for the forces of light. There is a tremendous celebration, in which the hero is honored in a very special way. He is granted a vision of the Great Dance; a vision of the essential nature of the universe.

The Great Dance does not wait to be perfect until [we] are gathered into it. We speak not of when it will begin. It has begun from before always. There was no time when we did not rejoice before [God's] face as now. The dance which we dance is at the center, and for the dance all things were made.

How easy it is to focus our time and energy on how imperfect life can be. But there is comfort to be found in deep prayer. We come to see those very imperfections as part of the larger tapestry of grace. Easter takes on new meaning as part of the great dance, for which all things have been made.

What is your picture of Heaven? Do you think about it at all? I have been thinking about it lately because in the Christian Ethics class I am taking we talk a lot about Heaven and God's Kingdom.

In our denomination we talk about helping people and walking in Jesus' footsteps because it is the right and kind thing to do. That will certainly help get us to Heaven, but we don't talk about Heaven and God's Kingdom as much some other denominations.

When I was a little girl, I made a card for an elderly neighbor who was sick. I took the card to her and she called me a little angel. I ran home and told my mother I needed a harp because Mrs. Carroll told me I'm an angel and angels play harps. My mother told me I would be given one when I got to heaven and the other angels would teach me how to play it.

As I got older I didn't think much about heaven, although sometimes on a Summer day I would go into the back yard and stare up at the sky and clouds and imagine God and Angels flying around up there.

After my husband died I had some counseling sessions with our then Minister, Chris. At one of the sessions he asked me where I thought John was. The first thing that popped into my mind was a golf course. I pictured him making lots of birdies and eagles and being very happy. It made me feel better.

None of us know what Heaven is like, but right now I am going to stick to my picture of golf courses and angels flying around playing harps, and oh yes, lots of friendly dolphins.

I do know that God wants us there with Him and He will keep nudging us to do the right and kind things and loving our neighbors as ourselves. We don't need to talk about it, just act on it.



The First Congregational Church of Manchester, NH marked its 193rd Annual Meeting on March 7, 2021, with a first ever Zoom gathering, an acknowledgement of the challenges of the past year. The usual business items were discharged ably, thanks to the recording ability of Karen Hawver, the diligence of Treasurer Jeffrey Frye and Linda Bonetti, Chair of Nominations Lucia Carlisle, and Pastor Kevin Pleas. The budget for 2021 passed, the congregation accepted the names of people nominated to various committees, voted to accept the reports of various committees, and heard the reading of the names of members who passed away during the year. (All this information is available in the two documents of the *Annual Report for 2020: Financials and Committee Reports.*)

Discussions regarding the state of onsite activities as well as the professional look of virtual services took place (with thanks to the talents of Adam Peithmann and the willingness of Barbara Papagian to assume more responsibilities). The Reopening Task Force has recommended remaining as is until the summer months. If statistics are positive come June, then a gradual reopening will ensue during the summer, with the hope of resuming full services in September. It was also acknowledged that there should be some online component in addition to in-house services.

The meeting concluded, with thanks to all the staff, committees, chairs, volunteers and, indeed, to the entire congregation for their patience and commitment in helping First Church remain active and connected throughout the year. We are truly blessed by the Grace of God.


